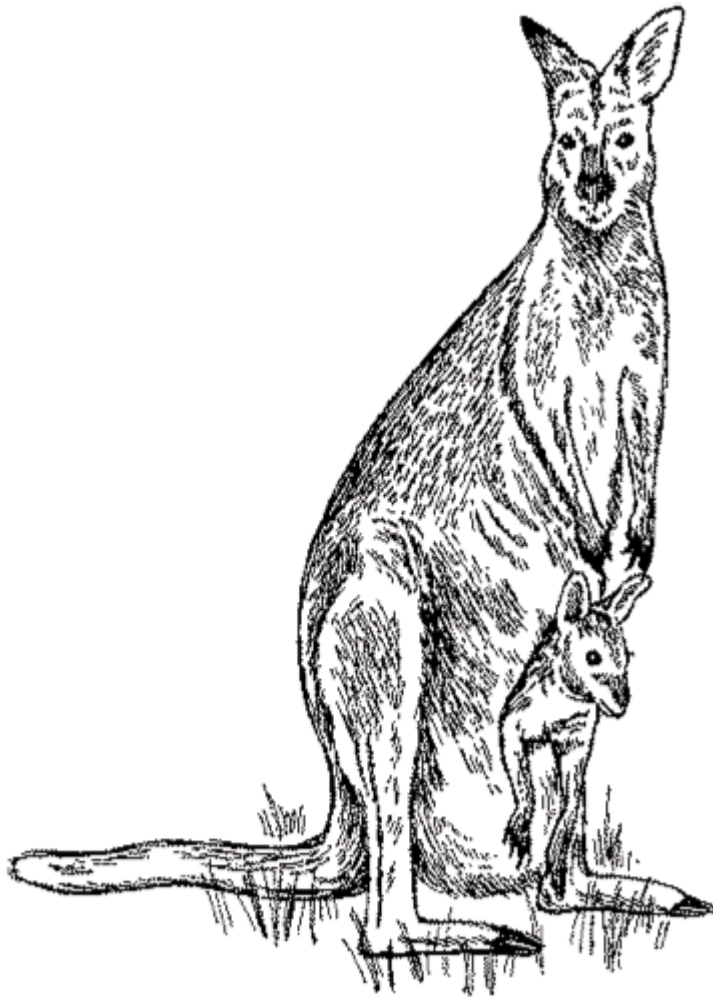

APPROXIMATE TIME: 60 Minutes

Suggestions for teachers:

1. The activities take you through a large portion of the Saint Louis Zoo. Makes sure your students are familiar with the zoo layout or have a map.
2. Divide your students into groups of five or fewer students with an adult

Suggested Pre-Visit Activities

1. Review these pages ahead of time with your students so they will have an idea of what they will be doing at the zoo.
2. Be sure that your students are familiar with the concepts of **rainforest**, **endangered species**, and **adaptation**.

Answer Key

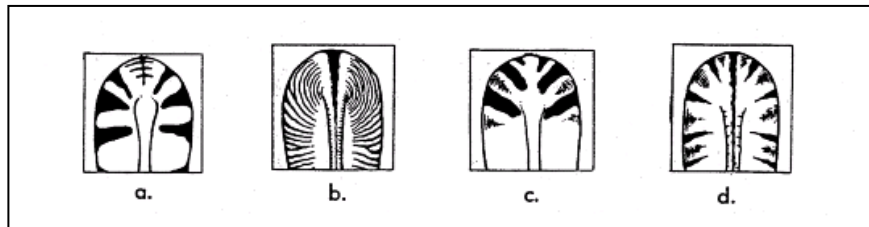
